# Report of the Board of Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2018

The Board of Trustees present their annual report for the year ended 31 December 2018, together with the audited financial statements for the year which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and financial statements for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting for Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

### Purpose and activities

### Charitable purposes

#### These are:

- The promotion of any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community in the county of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly and in particular the advancement of education, the protection of good health, both mental and physical and the relief of poverty and sickness.
- Other exclusively charitable purposes in the United Kingdom and elsewhere which are in the
  opinion of the trustees beneficial to the community including those in the area of benefit.

### Public benefit, aims and objectives

The charity complies with the public benefit requirement through its grant making programmes.

We want Cornwall & the Isles of Scilly to be a great place to live for everyone - a place where people work together to address disadvantage and build strong, resilient communities.

Our mission is to inspire local giving to meet local needs. We aim to make sustainable funding available to address disadvantage and build strong communities by promoting effective philanthropy.

We have three strategic priorities:

- To increase substantially the funds at our disposal;
- To deliver an efficient and effective grants programme;
- To be at the core of the voluntary sector in Cornwall.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy each year.

The grant making programmes are wholly directed at supporting community groups within Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly.

The charity's fund development work is aimed at ensuring the funds continue to be available in the future so that income can be generated to continue to support the above groups for the benefit of the residents in the county.

In addition to the guidance from Charity Commission and the Fundraising Regulator the trustees have also used the Charity Governance Code as their frame of reference.

### Strategic report

# Review of achievements and plans for the future (incorporating Chairman's Report)

It has been a year of economic uncertainty for every corner of Britain, which means Cornish communities need our help more than ever so we're proud to report on our recent achievements and to reveal our future goals.

In the past 12 months, the Cornwall Community Foundation (CCF) has awarded £733,102 in grants, an increase of 27% on the previous year (£575,669). 485 groups and individuals in communities received grants, made possible by funding from 63 funds and grant programmes managed by the CCF on behalf of donors. This comes at a time when Community Foundations collectively across the UK have passed the milestone of awarding more than £1 billion to support local communities.

Since 2003, the CCF has awarded more than £8 million to 4800 local, grass-roots projects in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. The CCF celebrated its 15th anniversary last year with a special reception attended by our Patron HRH The Duchess of Cornwall, donors, trustees, volunteers and staff, together with community groups who had received grants from us.

At the end of 2018 the total funds held and managed in the CCF's endowment was £4,904,530 (an increase of £188,746 in a year) and assets totalled £5,875,832 (an increase of £243,173 in a year). The financial objective of the CCF is to maintain at least the real value of the assets while generating a growing income to fund grant making. The investment objective is to produce the best financial return from its endowment within an acceptable level of risk. Several new endowment funds were established during 2018. The CCF received £492,887 in new endowment donations in 2018. The Patrixbourne Fund supports community projects across Cornwall, The North Cornwall Fund was established for this specific area. The Worval Foundation awarded £36,921 in its first year to provide opportunities for young disadvantaged people. The Healeys Charitable Trust Fund will support young entrepreneurs in Cornwall. United Downs Geothermal Community Fund awarded £10,000 in Gwennap, St Day, Carharrack and Lanner. Examples of our significant immediate impact funds are the #iwill programme (£82,445), Goonhilly Wind Farm (£56,670), East Langford Solar Farm (£49,275) and our Community Fund (£48,316). The #iwill programme, a joint initiative by the UK Government, the Big Lottery Fund and the CCF, supported projects that engage young people through community involvement to develop additional skills that are life-changing. The Duke of Cornwall's Benevolent Fund appointed the CCF to award £10,000 to young carers, £20,000 to support individuals in crisis and £35,000 to help young people with mental health issues. The Lord Lieutenant's Fund for Youth awarded £17,736 to gifted young people.

Our Vital Signs research identified high level of child deprivation as one of the key issues in Cornwall. We managed to invest more than £200,000 in supporting children and young people last year.

Our grants team delivered 10 drop-in sessions in the most deprived neighbourhoods in Cornwall, sponsored by the Tanner Trust. A total of 124 groups attended the workshops, of which 67 had not applied to us previously. As a result, we received more first-time applications from volunteer led community groups.

Our fund development aims to increase substantially the funds at our disposal by prioritising endowment; encouraging annual contributions; increasing the contribution from local businesses and building an extensive base of friends.

The Cornwall Club continues to raise funds through our Second Home Owner Scheme and its membership scheme and supporting people in hardship through our Crisis and Community Fund. The North Cornwall Fund has received much support from people who are passionate about helping this area.

Our business club celebrated its 10th anniversary last year and awarded a total of £32,333 to 15 community projects. The generosity of our members has been wonderful – Healey's Cornish Cyder Farm and St Austell Brewery supported our events with drinks, and Savills and Foot Anstey sponsored our London event. Our Friends scheme is a very inclusive scheme with membership fees starting at £25 a year. We currently have 372 Friends. We are very grateful to the Garfield Weston Foundation, The Albert Van Den Bergh Charitable Trust and Alan Rogers for supporting our Philanthropy Director position.

Our team has attended several training sessions in preparation for the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). Data Processing Policy and Data Breach Policy were developed in line with recommendation from the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) and a Privacy Notice page was added to our website.

Our ambition remains to increase our endowment to £10m and grant award £1m annually. We are committed to meet the increasing demand on funding by bringing together people who want to help Cornish communities with projects that make a real difference.

We aim to work closer with professional advisors to support their clients' charitable goals. We offer similar support to corporate donors who have an interest in the local community and are interested in putting their corporate social responsibility into practice.

Almost all income generation activity is undertaken by CCF trustees and staff or on our behalf through introductions made by ambassadors and volunteers. We also connect to potential donors and partners through networking and by raising our profile through communications.

#### We will not:

- use direct marketing, telephone, doorstep or on-street fundraising;
- use professional fundraising agencies to raise income on our behalf; or
- share information about donors or supporters without their express permission.

The CCF maintains records of all complaints received and during the year received no complaints on its fundraising activities.

I am optimistic about the future prospects for struggling Cornish communities, and I hope reading this report does the same for you, so on behalf of the trustees, I would like to give a heartfelt thanks to our supporters, volunteers, friends, donors, fundholders, and our dedicated staff. Their hard work and enthusiasm really has enabled the CCF to strengthen local communities and change people's lives. The CCF could not have achieved all this without the invaluable support and guidance from my fellow trustees and I thank them wholeheartedly for the time and dedication they freely give.

## Report of the Board of Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2018

#### Financial review

The total income for the year was £1,737,502 (2017: £1,541,918). Total expenditure was £1,041,292. (2017: £853,643), giving net incoming movement in funds for the year of £243,173 (2017: incoming £962,374) after investment losses of £453,037 (2017: gains of £274,099).

At the year-end total charity funds were £5,875,832 (2017; £5,632,659). This consisted of endowment funds of £4,904,530 (2017; £4,715,784), restricted funds of £728,087 (2017; £678,210) and unrestricted funds of £243,215 (2017; £238,665).

### Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investments which the trustees see fit. The trustees regularly review internal financial information to ensure their financial position is such that it is adequate to provide sufficient resources to perform the charity's objects in all types of conditions and to act accordingly. The trustees have reflected on the need to balance risk and return on its reserves and have decided to maintain a balance between equity investments and interest bearing accounts.

### **Grant making policy**

The charity considers applications for funding support on a regular basis. Applications are reviewed against specific criteria and the amount granted is based on available funds.

### Reserves policy

It is the trustees' view that it is prudent to accumulate free reserves to be able to cover anticipated administration costs to sustain its operations, during any period when income generating activities may temporarily cease. The trustees therefore consider that reserves should be held to finance at least nine months of budgeted operating costs which is approximately £180,000. At the year end the general fund was £232,943 (2017: £202,903). The level of reserves held is closely monitored by the trustees.

### Structure, Governance and Management

The Cornwall Community Foundation is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 1 July 2003 and registered as a charity on 10 October 2003. The charity is administered by a board of trustees which meets a minimum of three times a year. A Chief Executive who is not a trustee is appointed by the board to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

### Recruitment and induction of trustees

Suitable candidates are selected by the existing trustees and invited to become trustees. New trustees are inducted into the workings of the charity.

### Pay policy for senior staff

The pay of the senior staff is reviewed annually. In view of the nature of the charity, the directors benchmark against pay levels in other similar organisations.

### Related parties

None of the trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity.

Any connection between a trustee or senior staff member with a grant recipient or supplier of the charity is disclosed to the board of Trustees in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party.

In the current year no such related party transactions were reported.

#### Risk assessment

The trustees have assessed the principal risks and uncertainties to which the charity is exposed and have established systems to mitigate those risks. The principal financial risk is a loss of income through falling donations and investment performance. This is monitored to ensure expenditure is kept within the funds available. This is an ongoing procedure and is subject to regular review.

A risk assessment is carried out annually as part of the CCF's Quality Assurance accreditation, covering all aspects of the charity's activities and scored according to probability and impact. Remedial measure are taken where required.

#### **Auditors**

A resolution proposing that RRL LLP be reappointed as auditors will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### Opinion

#### 1 General information

The company is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. In the event of the company being wound up each member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £10 towards the debts and liabilities of the company and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up. There were 16 members at 31 December 2018 (2017: 15).

### 2 Summary of significant accounting policies

#### 2.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

Cornwall Community Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note. The financial statements are prepared in Sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

#### 2.2 Income

Incoming resources including grants receivable are accounted for in the period in which the charitable company is entitled to receipt.

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteers' time in line with the SORP (FRS102).

#### 2.3 Bequests and legacies

A legacy or bequest is recognised in the financial statements when the certainty of receipt and the amount receivable has been established.

#### 2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

Grants payable are charged in the period when the offer is conveyed to the recipient except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the period end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

### 2.5 Unrestricted and designated funds

These funds have been made available to the trustees without specific conditions. The use of unrestricted funds is entirely at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

#### 2.6 Restricted funds

These funds are made available to the trustees with specific conditions imposed by the donors as to the nature of their use.

#### 2.7 Endowment funds

These include a permanent endowment fund which is to be held permanently and only the income from it is used for charitable activities. Expendable endowment funds are primarily held to provide income but the trustees also have the option to spend the fund capital on charitable activities.

#### 2.8 Transfers

Transfers are made when appropriate from a specific fund to recover costs incurred not charged directly to that fund.

#### 2.9 Taxation

The company is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the test set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

#### 2.10 Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

The charity operates a defined contribution pension plan for the benefit of its employees. Contributions are expensed as they become payable.

### 2.11 Fixed asset investments

Investments are stated in the financial statements at fair/market value. Unrealised gains on investments are calculated by reference to the difference between fair/market value from one year to the next. Realised gains or losses are calculated by reference to the difference between proceeds of sale and the carrying value of the investment at the previous year end.

### 2.12 Debtors and creditors

Debtors receivable and creditors payable within one year are recorded at transaction price.

### 2.13 Operating leases

Rental charges are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the life of the lease.
