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Report of the Board of Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2019

The Board of Trustees present their annual report for the year ended 31 December 2019, together with the audited financial statements for the year which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and financial statements for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting for Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

Purpose and activities

Charitable purposes

These are:

- The promotion of any charitable purposes for the benefit of the community in the county of Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly and in particular the advancement of education, the protection of good health, both mental and physical and the relief of poverty and sickness.
- Other exclusively charitable purposes in the United Kingdom and elsewhere which are in the opinion of the trustees beneficial to the community including those in the area of benefit.

Public benefit, aims and objectives

The charity complies with the public benefit requirement through its grant making programmes.

We want Cornwall & the Isles of Scilly to be a great place to live for everyone - a place where people work together to address disadvantage and build strong, resilient communities.

Our mission is to inspire local giving to meet local needs. We aim to make sustainable funding available to address disadvantage and build strong communities by promoting effective philanthropy.

We have three strategic priorities:

- To increase substantially the funds at our disposal;
- To deliver an efficient and effective grants programme;
- To be at the core of the voluntary sector in Cornwall.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy each year.

The grant making programmes are wholly directed at supporting community groups within Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly.

The charity's fund development work is aimed at ensuring the funds continue to be available in the future so that income can be generated to continue to support the above groups for the benefit of the residents in the county.

In addition to the guidance from Charity Commission and the Fundraising Regulator the trustees have also used the Charity Governance Code as their frame of reference.

Strategic report

Review of achievements and plans for the future (incorporating Chairman's Report)

In 2019 the Cornwall Community Foundation (CCF) awarded £734,870 to 469 community projects and individuals. In a time when inequality is increasing we can be very proud to say that the CCF has stepped up to the challenge of meeting the growing need.

Since 2003, the CCF has awarded more than £9 million to 5,000 local, grass-roots projects in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. At the end of 2019, CCF's assets totalled £8,298,138 (an increase of £2,422,306 in the year), of which, total funds held and managed in the CCF's endowment was £7,025,313 (an increase of £2,120,783 in the year). The financial objective of the CCF is to maintain at least the real value of the assets while generating a growing income to fund grant making. The investment objective is to produce the best financial return from its endowment within an acceptable level of risk.

The CCF received £1,360,372 in new endowment donations in 2019. Several new endowment funds were established during 2019. One of these, The Viscountess Boyd Charitable Trust, supports community projects in South East Cornwall and another family trust fund was transferred to our Community Fund to support projects all across Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. The Lanherne Fund was established to strengthen community projects focusing on the environment.

The CCF received £120,000 from Cornwall Council and the National Lottery Communities Fund to establish the Headstart Kernow Fund to improve young peoples' mental health. We are very grateful to The Duke of Cornwall's Benevolent Fund for the £20,000 donation towards the Crisis Fund and the £25,000 donation to match fund the #iwill programme. The #iwill programme, a joint initiative by the UK Government, the Big Lottery Fund and the CCF, supported projects that engage young people through community involvement to develop additional skills that are life-changing. Our Crisis Fund supports individuals in a crisis situation and the £44,499 awarded from this fund demonstrates the increasing challenges that many people are facing. Thanks to match funding from The Goldsmiths' Company Charity we were able to award £44,065 to organisations helping elderly people. The Lord Lieutenant's Fund for Youth awarded £21,612 to gifted young people.

Our fund development aims to substantially increase the funds at our disposal by prioritising endowment; encouraging annual contributions; increasing the contribution from local businesses and building an extensive base of supporters through membership schemes.

Our Friends scheme is a very inclusive scheme with membership fees starting at £25 a year. At the end of 2019 we had 371 Friends. The Cornwall Women's Fund was established in 2019 to help community programmes that benefit women and 21 members have joined the new scheme.

Our Business Club awarded a total of £33,589 to 16 community projects in 2019. Great Western Railway also donated £32,000 to support jobseekers and young people experiencing mental health challenges. The networking breakfasts for our business supporters were increasingly popular and gave the opportunity to our members to meet representatives from inspiring projects that they had supported. Many of our business supporters helped us beyond their membership fees. Rodda's Creamery and St Austell Brewery supported our events with drinks and CCLA and The Nare Hotel sponsored our London event.

The Cornwall Club is going from strength to strength and provides vital support for our Community Fund. The North Cornwall Fund continues to build momentum and started to grant award by distributing £13,295 last year.

We are very grateful to the Garfield Weston Foundation and Alan Rogers for supporting our Philanthropy Director position.

We are dedicated to adhering to the highest fundraising standards and are registered with the Fundraising Regulator. We continue to invest in staff training, and in September 2019, staff members and Trustees participated in the UK Community Foundations' biennial conference in Glasgow.

We are getting closer to realising our ambition to reach £10m in endowments and grant award £1m annually. Almost all income generation activity is undertaken by CCF trustees and staff or on our behalf through introductions made by ambassadors and volunteers. We also connect to potential donors and partners through networking and by raising our profile through communications.

We will not:

- use direct marketing, telephone, doorstep or on-street fundraising;
- use professional fundraising agencies to raise income on our behalf; or
- share information about donors or supporters without their express permission.

The CCF maintains records of all complaints received and during the year received no complaints on its fundraising activities. We take data protection seriously, however in November 2019 one of our email addresses was used to send out a hoax email. No viruses or malware were sent in this hoax email and no data was compromised. We have reported the data breach to the Information Commissioner's Office and the ICO informed us at the end of November that this case did not reach the requirements for regulatory action and closed the case.

Every year brings different challenges and we are constantly adapting to meet the needs of the Cornish communities. Nobody foresaw the huge challenge that the Coronavirus Pandemic would bring in 2020.

The CCF responded very quickly to the emerging need and started to grant award from its Emergency Fund on 13th March – ten days before lockdown started. During the first six months of the Covid-19 response we distributed £990,305 from our Crisis and Emergency Funds. Our Coronavirus Emergency Appeal raised £1,640,359 during the same period, including £563,759 from the National Emergency Trust. Cornwall Council and The Duke of Cornwall's Benevolent Fund contributed £100,000 each to the Appeal. The team has been busier than ever in dealing with applications, whilst working remotely, but the CCF has adapted and risen to the challenge. The CCF remains in a strong financial position, particularly with its investment positions having now recovered from the initial drop. I believe no other organisation is better placed to reach out to the grassroots community projects that hold our communities together.

I cannot thank enough the Trustees of the CCF, our volunteers and staff members for their dedicated support. It is a privilege to work alongside such a passionate team and the results in 2019 speak for themselves. I look forward to seeing the CCF continue to flourish in 2020 and know that together we can rise to the challenges that it will bring.

Financial review

The total income for the year was £2,717,133 (2018: £1,737,502). Total expenditure was £1,045,449 (2018: £1,041,292), giving net incoming movement in funds for the year of £2,422,306 (2018: incoming £243,173) after investment gains of £750,622 (2018: losses of £453,037).

At the year-end total charity funds were £8,298,138 (2018: £5,875,832). This consisted of endowment funds of £7,025,313 (2018: £4,904,530), restricted funds of £1,021,341 (2018: £728,087) and unrestricted funds of £251,484 (2018: £243,215).

Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investments which the trustees see fit. The trustees regularly review internal financial information to ensure their financial position is such that it is adequate to provide sufficient resources to perform the charity's objects in all types of conditions and to act accordingly. The trustees have reflected on the need to balance risk and return on its reserves and have decided to maintain a balance between equity investments and interest bearing accounts.

Grant making policy

The charity considers applications for funding support on a regular basis. Applications are reviewed against specific criteria and the amount granted is based on available funds.

Reserves policy

It is the trustees' view that it is prudent to accumulate free reserves to be able to cover anticipated administration costs to sustain its operations, during any period when income generating activities may temporarily cease. The trustees therefore consider that reserves should be held to finance at least nine months of budgeted operating costs which is approximately £180,000. At the year end the general fund was £218,784 (2018: £232,943). The level of reserves held is closely monitored by the trustees.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Cornwall Community Foundation is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 1 July 2003 and registered as a charity on 10 October 2003. The charity is administered by a board of trustees which meets a minimum of three times a year. A Chief Executive, who is not a trustee, is appointed by the board to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

Recruitment and induction of trustees

Suitable candidates are selected by the existing trustees and invited to become trustees. New trustees are invited to the CCF office for an induction meeting with the Chief Executive and the team in order to gain further understanding of the operations of the CCF. In addition, all Trustees are invited to attend the Grants Committee meetings. Trustees are also invited to training opportunities such as conferences and training courses to deepen their understanding of the context for the network of Community Foundations.

Pay policy for senior staff

The pay of the senior staff is reviewed annually. In view of the nature of the charity, the directors benchmark against pay levels in other similar organisations.

Related parties

None of the trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity.

Any connection between a trustee or senior staff member with a grant recipient or supplier of the charity is disclosed to the board of Trustees in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party.

In the current year no such related party transactions were reported.

Risk assessment

The trustees have assessed the principal risks and uncertainties to which the charity is exposed and have established systems to mitigate those risks. The principal financial risk is a loss of income through falling donations and investment performance. This is monitored to ensure expenditure is kept within the funds available. This is an ongoing procedure and is subject to regular review.

A risk assessment is carried out annually as part of the CCF's Quality Assurance accreditation, covering all aspects of the charity's activities and scored according to probability and impact. Remedial measure is taken where required.

Auditors

A resolution proposing that RRL LLP be reappointed as auditors will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

Notes

(forming part of the financial statements)

1 General information

The company is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. In the event of the company being wound up each member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £10 towards the debts and liabilities of the company and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up. There were 17 members at 31 December 2019 (2018: 16).

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

2.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

Cornwall Community Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note. The financial statements are prepared in Sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

2.2 Income

Incoming resources including grants receivable are accounted for in the period in which the charitable company is entitled to receipt.

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteers' time in line with the SORP (FRS102).

2.3 Bequests and legacies

A legacy or bequest is recognised in the financial statements when the certainty of receipt and the amount receivable has been established.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

Grants payable are charged in the period when the offer is conveyed to the recipient except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the period end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

2.5 Unrestricted and designated funds

These funds have been made available to the trustees without specific conditions. The use of unrestricted funds is entirely at the discretion of the trustees. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

2.6 Restricted funds

These funds are made available to the trustees with specific conditions imposed by the donors as to the nature of their use.

2.7 Endowment funds

These include a permanent endowment fund which is to be held permanently and only the income from it is used for charitable activities. Expendable endowment funds are primarily held to provide income but the trustees also have the option to spend the fund capital on charitable activities.

2.8 Transfers

Transfers are made when appropriate from a specific fund to recover costs incurred not charged directly to that fund.

2.9 Taxation

The company is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the test set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

2.10 Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

The charity operates a defined contribution pension plan for the benefit of its employees. Contributions are expensed as they become payable.

2.11 Fixed asset investments

Investments are stated in the financial statements at fair/market value. Unrealised gains on investments are calculated by reference to the difference between fair/market value from one year to the next. Realised gains or losses are calculated by reference to the difference between proceeds of sale and the carrying value of the investment at the previous year end.

2.12 Debtors and creditors

Debtors receivable and creditors payable within one year are recorded at transaction price.

2.13 Operating leases

Rental charges are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the life of the lease.
